Measles on the Increase

NHS England reported in January this year that Measles is again on the increase across England including Greater Manchester, and parents of Children aged from 6 to 11 years are urged to contact their child's GP practice for their missed MMR vaccination.

NHS figures show more than 3.4 million children under the age of 16 years are either unprotected or not fully protected and at risk of catching these serious and completely preventable diseases.

Measles is a serious illness, with one in five children who get the disease having to be admitted to hospital for treatment.

It is important that vaccines are given on time for the best protection, but if a vaccine is missed it is not too late to catch up.

Appointments are available to book online for you to select a day and time which is convenient for you with one of our very friendly practice nurses.

Dr. Paul Jackson



They say a Truly Good Doctor is hard to find, difficult to part with and impossible to forget. Born in 1962, educated and lives in Bury, he has been with the practice since 1997. Missed Appointments and What it Means To Patients Needing An Appointment.

We will be reporting in each issue of the newsletter the previous quarters' missed appointments at this practice and what it could mean to you if you needed an appointment quickly.

In this issue we are showing the missed appointments i.e. where patients did not attend their appointment and did not cancel their appointment for the months of December 2023 and January 2024.

The Nursing Team had the greater number of missed appointments at 152 over the two months and this was made up as follows:

The Nursing Team - 152 Missed Appointments

82-Blood Tests

30–Annual Reviews including Diabetic, Chronic Heart Disease or other annual reviews.

15-Cervical Screening Tests

11-Other

10-Child Immunisations.

4-ECGs.

GPs - 305 Missed Appointments

223–Routine Telephone Consultations and Telephone Triage.

64–Routine Pre-booked Face to Face Appointments.

18-Other, Includes Joint Injections.

Prior to the appointment patients receive at least one reminder via a text message which gives the opportunity at any stage to cancel the appointment simply by replying with the word CANCEL. This then removes the appointment from the GP or Nurse and frees up a slot should another patient come in needing an appointment quickly, getting the treatment they need.

Please if you are unable to attend your appointment please cancel it and help reduce the number of missed appointments and give another patient the opportunity of that time.

Patient Chronic Disease Annual Reviews.

We would like to remind all our patients the importance of attending your annual reviews.

These reviews allows the Nurse or Doctor to monitor your chronic condition and make any necessary changes to your medication if needed and also refer you on for further disease management if appropriate.



Ensure We Have Your Correct Contact Details.

Moved house or changed your phone number? If you have not let us know then we are unable to communicate with you quickly and efficiently. We offer an SMS service to communicate various reminders and self book links for appointments, for example flu clinics, immunisation invitations and annual health checks.

Bowel Screening.

NHS bowel cancer screening checks if you could have bowel cancer. It's available to everyone aged 60 to 74 years.

The programme is expanding to make it available to everyone aged 50 to 59 years. This is happening gradually over 4 years and started in April 2021.

You use a home test kit, called a faecal immunochemical test (FIT), to collect a small sample of poo and send it to a lab. This is checked for tiny amounts of blood.

Blood can be a sign of polyps or bowel cancer. Polyps are growths in the bowel. They are not cancer, but may turn into cancer over time.

If the test finds anything unusual, you might be asked to go to hospital to have further tests to confirm or rule out cancer.

Always see a GP if you have symptoms of bowel cancer at any age, even if you have recently completed a NHS bowel cancer screening test kit – do not wait to have a screening test.

Is the NHS App in Your Pocket.

If you haven't already registered for the NHS APP do it now. It will allow you to take control of your prescriptions, order when you want, and check the status of your prescriptions whenever is convenient for yourself.

There are a variety of different appointment types available to book online, including:

- Routine GP Telephone or Face to Face Consultation.
- Chronic Disease Annual Review.
- Cervical Screening (Smears)
- Baby or Child Immunisations.
- New Muscle or Joint Pain ONLY.

There is no need to contact the practice for the above appointments. Unfortunately there is no option to book a Face to Face appointment with a GP or Nurse.

You can also view your test results. medical records and letters from consultants to your GP.

AGGRESSIVE BEHAVIOUR

We would like to remind patients that the practice operates a ZERO policy towards aggressive behaviour from patients towards staff. We have noticed over the past couple of years an increase in this sort of behaviour towards staff, even outside the surgery environment. We understand the frustrations patients face in obtaining appointments etc but it is not the fault of the staff, they only work within the system constraints. Recently a member of staff was shopping and was confronted with abusive language from a patient because of the problems with the telephones. If this behaviour continues from a patient after a written warning they can be removed from our list of patients & either you would need to register at another practice or if the police have had to be called you will be placed on a special patient list and would have to attend a special surgery for aggressive patients.
